COAL SHORTAGE ACUTE RAILROADS LACK MOTIVE POWER

The fuel situation is becoming a mighty serious matter in Malheur County. No section has a sufficient supply, nor prospects for a sufficient supply of fuel. Many sections are now experiencing an acute shortage with no relief in sight and the only preventative for much suffering will be an extremely mild and open winters

We are not making any fuss, so to speak, but the sooner the American government, the American people and the railroads can factor on the war perplexities in connection with transportation the better for all con-

Due to lack of motive power the average haul for a loaded car of coal from Utah to Oregon is 20 miles per day, apparently at that is requires from a month to six weeks after issuance of a bill of lading before delivery. The railroads, the stockholders, the managers and the employees are unquestionably just as loyal as any other class of Americans. They undoubtedly are doing the best they can under the present conditions. But the big problem is to change those conditions making it possible for the railroads to more adequately meet the special war requirements.

Due to intense interest in pushing the main issue, the government has been overlooking, ignoring and sometimes crushing local and personal rights. The government, like the railroads, is short of administrative power and is letting many little things slide.

Due to the supreme necessity of an increased earning power to meet the high cost of living, even on a Hooverized basis, the American people, laborer, employer, merchant, professional, farmer and every class have been applying too much individualism and provincialism to their patriotism.

The only basis for a speedy and equitable remedy for much injustice and more inefficiency is a proper appreciation of one anothers necessities and obligations. In order to maintain the proper amount of cooperation from the people to the administration, that is not actual personal sacrifice not mere proclaimed patriotism, the government must adjust its war program to include America as well as Europe. We are now conserving food so that our allies and soldiers may be well fed, but in order to push the war and feed Europe, America is allowed to become chilled and to gamble on the temperature and north wind as to whether they will freeze to death or not. The Government must look after the basic human needs of the people, food, shelter, clothing and fuel in order to maintain the morale of the industrial and agricultural supports of the army.

It is of course paramount that war supplies, munitions, etc, have the right of way as far as required and that no time be lost in transportation from factory to port and from port to Europe. Yet, if the first unit of transportation is neglected, that from the field to the market or from the forest to the mill or from the mine to the smelter, the remainder will

Getting down to brass tacks, the railroads are not capable of handling this war emergency. Nor is it all their fault. Unfair and unscientific rates based on a competitive instead of a cost system is responsible for the present shortage of cars, motive power and system. The American railroads, eastern and western must all be united into one unified system and under one management. There never has been any such thing as railroad competition as far as price adjusting to the general public goes. The only competition the railroads have ever given one another has resulted in corrupting rebates and senseless long hauls at short haul rates.

Government ownership or control, something, is necessary that will eliminate unnecessary and expensive mileage, that will secure a satisfactory distribution and minimum supply of cars, that will provide for suffiof vast amounts of freight in yards, that will be able to handle all classes of freight with proper dispatch and please both the people and the government with honest to goodness service.
