MUST GET COAL

Washington Order Threatens Discrimination Against Slackers. PORTLAND, Ore., June 14.—The Washington state Fuel Administration has served notice on household and industrial consumers that neglect to order fuel now may result in their being cut off from supplies later. The notice reads: "In case there is a coal shortage next winter, the consumers who have storage space, or who could have provided for storage of his coal and who did not, will not be supplied until all booked orders have been filled, and then he will be obliged to take his chances."

In this connection Fuel Administrator Holmes of Oregon does not desire to make the same order unless compelled to do so. He points out, however, that there are many people without means of fuel storage and some without money sufficient to order ahead, and that their needs must be met if possible. To that end he is of the opinion that the "fuel slacker"—that is, one who can buy and who does not, in the summer time—should not feel put out if such order is put into effect when cold weather sets in.
