CHURCH NOTES

SUBSTITUTES FOR GOD

Thou Shalt Have no Other Gods Before Me—(Exo. 20, 3.) Published Sunday Sermon.

Not being able, on account of the quarantine, to hold services Sunday, Reverend Clower of the Methodist Church is publishing a short Sunday morning sermon which follows:

The history of all nations show that they have had their forms of worship, and their different Gods. The Ephesians had their Diana, Greece had their numerous deities. These were only substitutes for the living God.

Today we hear and read, until it has become familiar to every household the German phrase, "Gott mit uns." Germany has only revived the old war god of the Norsemen, Odin or Woden. The plates that are carried by every one of the German soldiers bear the picture of this god, and the inscription, "Strike them all dead; the day of judgment will ask no questions only show that this god is the substitute of the living Savior.

The substitution of this war god was made that Germany might be able to carry out her plan of conquest. This god according to the traditions of the Norsemen had his dwelling in a place, where he received the souls of the departed warriors.

These substitutes in the nations of the past have availed them nothing. They will avail nothing at the present time. The substitutes mentioned above are not the only ones that we can find in the world of today.

Nature worship can be carried to that extent that it becomes a substitute for God. We go into the forest, or on the broad prairie, on a Sunday morning there to enjoy nature. God is truly in nature, but to place the love of nature before the worship of God makes nature become a substitute for God.

The reign of law sometimes becomes the substitute for God. "Behold! He that keepeth Israel neither slumbers or sleeps."

Efficiency, that we have heard so much about recently, is raised to that extent that it becomes a substitute for God. We read that Israel worshipped the golden calf, but today men worship the golden eagle. The world has forgotten in its whirl of earthly pleasures that they are making this same pleasure a substitute for God. When this is carried to the extent that it excludes God it becomes idolatry.

Art sometimes becomes a substitute for the divine. When literature, painting or statuary is worshiped in place of the loving God it becomes a substitute for what is best in life.

The most subtle form of substitute for God is the placing of our wills before the will of the divine. We are finite, God is infinite. We make errors, but God is always right.

Anything that takes away from the Divine, or even divides that worship is a substitute for the God that the world should recognize as the true God.

Why American Farms Should be Improved Now--IT IS A CHALLENGE TO THE HUN The Government realizes the necessity of farm building, and has modified building regulations so that farmers may continue, with the full sanction of the authorities, to erect such buildings as may be necessary to keep farm production up to the maximum, provided the aggregate does not cost in the excess of \$1,000.00. Buildings costing in excess of the amount may also be erected by securing a permit. FARMERS SHOULD BUILD NOW--A BROAD INTERPRETATION IS PLACED UPON FARM CONSTRUCTION. This rule does not mean that a farmer is restricted to \$1,000.00 in his building operation. FOR EXAMPLE: Let us suppose a farmer wants to build a small barn, a hog house, a granary, an implement shed, a silo, and a poultry house. HE CAN BUILD THEM ALL, provided the total cost does not exceed \$1,000.00. IN ADDITION--The farmer is permitted repairs and additions to any existing building to the extent of \$2,500.00.
