The Government realizes the necessity of farm building, and has modified building regulations so that farmers may continue, with the full sanction of the authorities, to erect such buildings as may be necessary to keep farm production up to the maximum, provided the aggregate does not cost in the excess of \$1,000.00. Buildings costing in excess of the amount may also be erected by securing a permit.

FARMERS SHOULD BUILD NOW—A BROAD INTERPRETATION IS PLACED UPON FARM CONSTRUCTION. This rule does not mean that a farmer is restricted to \$1,000.00 in his building operation.
