According to the terms of the armistice the allied forces were to be stationed on the banks of the Rhine until the peace terms were settled. Then if Germany did not keep the terms the fighting would continue on German soil. The American doughboys made a formal entry into the Rhine territory December 12. The Germans are much impressed with the sturdiness and soldierly bearing of the Americans.

GET MAIL IN EARLY

Public Can Help Problems of Christmas Mail Rush and Facilitate Delivery.

The public can do much to help out the Christmas rush of mail which each year threatens to swamp the postal employees by regarding a few rules. The first of all is that packages should be mailed as early as possible. It is estimated that it takes twice as long to handle the mail that is placed in the offices at the last moment for the reason that it chokes up in the terminal stations.

One of the commonly disregarded rules is that of placing fancy stickers on the address side of the letter. These stickers are to be placed only on the back of the envelopes or package. If the public can remember to comply with a few simple rules the mails can be handled in a quick and convenient manner with the assurance that the "Santa Claus mail" will arrive on time.

Then he got peevish and informed me he was a major and he had a woman with him. Well I could not dispute his word, for he was a major alright and his side kicker sure did represent the gentler sex. He said he was going to cross my post to get to the steamer landing.
