### NEXT LOAN SHORT

New Secretary of Treasury Favors Short Time for Fifth Liberty Loan.

Carter Glass, the new Secretary of the Treasury, in a telegram to Governor James K. Lynch of the Twelfth Federal Reserve District announces that expenditures of the government during the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1918, exceeded nine billion six hundred million dollars and that expenditures in the month of November were nearly \$2,000,000,000. In the current month of December up to and including Dec. 16 expenditures were \$1,000,000,000. It is estimated that the total expenditures of the fiscal year will be \$18,000,000,000.

Secretary Glass favors short maturities for the Fifth Liberty Loan and announces that the Treasury Department will continue the sale of War Savings Stamps and Certificates in its most energetic manner.
