Soldiers and machine guns were rushed to the districts where the disturbances took place and the presence of these served to quiet the rioters and curb violence. Start Long Trip A. U. S. Martin bomber of the two engine type piloted by Lieut. R. S. Hartzel has started on a trip around the rim of the United States. The flight is the longest ever attempted by the army air service and will carry the machine thru many coast cities along the Atlantic, Pacific and the Gulf and also thru the cities on the Canadian border.
