ONTARIO

Lineman Killed While Working On Wire—High School Organizes Musical Club.

ONTARIO, Oregon, Nov. 21.—Clinton E. Frye, for many years a resident of Ontario, died here last Thursday. Mr. Frye practiced dentistry here for a number of years, but because of his ill health was obliged to turn over his practice to Doctor Roberts last Spring. Mr. Frye was born in Ohio, March 13th 1856. His death was caused by a form of heart disease. The funeral was held from the McDowell Funeral Parlors Saturday afternoon. Mr. Frye is survived by one daughter who resides in Spokane, Washington.
