Lots in the new Riverside townsite has been placed on sale. They were not placed on the market for speculation but for sale to those who intend to build immediately.

Win Game. The football game between Vale and Fruitland teams on Thanksgiving day resulted in a sweeping victory for Vale, the score being 37 to 0.

Home-seekers. A party of some twenty proposed settlers for Harney lands, passed thru Vale Monday. The party were from the middle west.

Wrestling. Those who witnessed the wrestling match at the Isis Hall Tuesday night

were well pleased with the showing made by Hank McNece against Nick Collins of Boise. There was no decision as neither of the men secured a fall.
