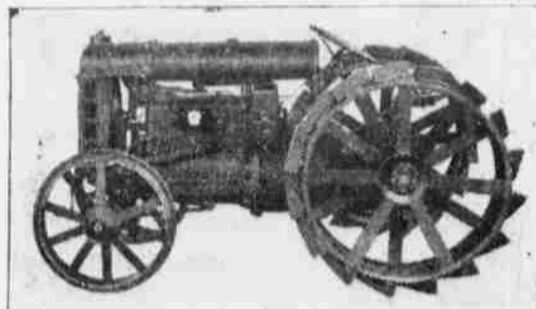

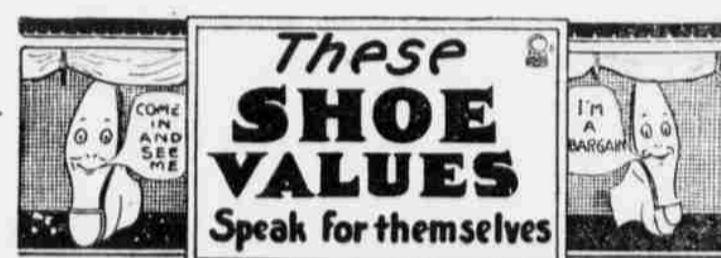
the same amount from outside voluntary donations.
