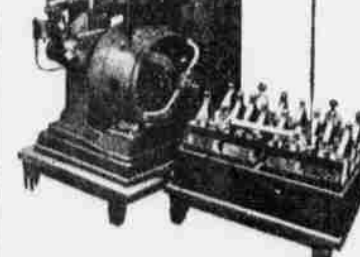
Funeral was held from the J. R. Blackaby home here, at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, March 2.

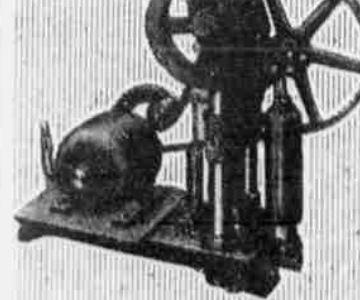

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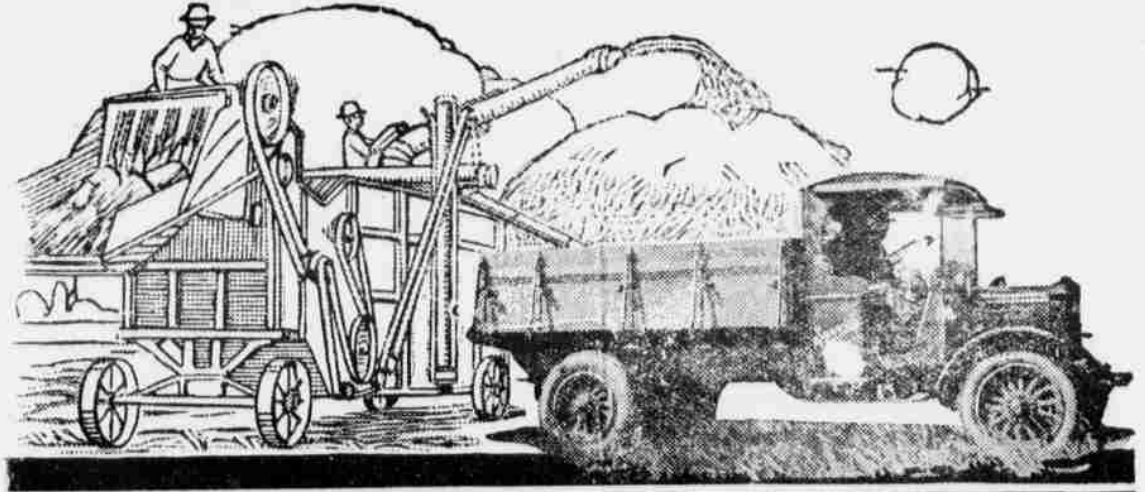


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
