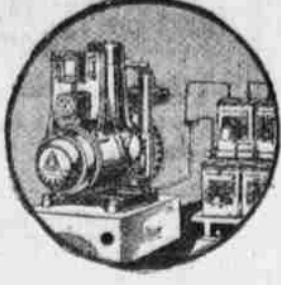


OUT DOOR ELECTRIC LIGHTS FOR THE FARM
