WASHINGTON—The house of representatives Tuesday agreed to a Senate amendment to the interior department bill, specifically authorizing the continuance of work on the American Falls reservoir.

The amendment gives specific authority to purchase and improve land for the new townsite to replace that part of the present town of American Falls that will be flooded by the American Falls reservoir.

When the bill was passed by the house that body adopted an amendment which specifically forbade the use of any part of the Minidoka appropriation in carrying out work on the American Falls reservoir project.
