GOVERNOR PLEDGES AID

taxes amounted to something over \$40,000,000, as I already have pointed out to you. There are hundreds of other bodies with power to levy taxes that for some reason or other did not take advantage of that power in 1922. They may take advantage of it in 1923, in 1924 or in any other year, if they desire to do so, and if they do your taxes from those sources will rise, rather than decrease. The Governor has in power over the actions of these levying bodies, save in an exceedingly few cases. Aside from the state taxes these levying bodies levy 94 per cent of the taxes that are paid by the people of Oregon. These taxes are under the control of people of various localities in the main and are as remote from the power of the executive to control as are the taxes of the federal government. Remember also that some \$15,000,000 went out of the pockets of the taxpayers in Oregon last year to pay these same federal government taxes, and the Governor was not responsible for that.

Governor Olcott went into other phases of state government which space will not permit publishing this week. The Enterprise will take them up in future issues of this paper.
