She had the rugged frame and strong constitution necessary for successful public work, a physical force which has kept her in active usefulness up to a short time of her passing away. In a less exacting walk in life she probably would have passed the one hundred mark. As a presiding officer she has ever been calm and self-poised, no matter how agitated the assemblage may have become. Such a personage is a great power, but sustained calmness under a great stress is a drain upon vitality. Her influence has been far reaching, and always she proclaimed the triumph of the hom over the enemy of the home—the rum traffic. Miss Elenor Gordon, vice president will assume the duties of president.

In the loss of our state president a voice of eloquence has been hushed. Always frail, Mrs. Booker dedicated her life to the work of the Great Father, and faltered not at any task in the service. A most impressive service was held at the First Baptist church, of which denomination she was an or-

daind minister. The work in the state will be continued by Mrs. Henrietta Brown of Albany. Mrs. Brown presided over the convention last fall which elected Mrs. Booker president, and is thoroughly conversant with the needs and conditions of the state work.

Friend's Church
Through the efforts of Edward and Myra B. Smith, Lents "Friend's Church" was organized in Dec. 1909, with a membership of forty-six. By their faithful and untiring labors, a strong church has been built up, also a thriving Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Society. Due perhaps to their strenuous work in building up the church, Edward Smith's health failed, so that he was no longer able to assist his wife in the work which she carried on alone for a few years.

In September 1913, Myra B. Smith resigned as Pastor, and Rev. John Riley of Boise, Idaho, was chosen to fill the vacancy, and is Pastor at the present time. Mr. Riley was born in Ohio just before the Civil war, and has had years of experience in evangelistic work, extending from Maine to California. He is a disciple of Dr. Dougan Clark, having been under his instruction in the Biblical department of Earlham college, Richmond, Ind. He was founder of the Friend's Church at Colorado Springs, Colo. For some time he was Pastor of the large church at Spiceland, Ind. He also filled pastorates in DeMoines, Iowa and Cleveland, Ohio.

The Sunday school is prospering under the management of C. C. Barker. The Christian Endeavor is one of the most active in the city, and has been conducting the Monday night service at one of the missions in the city, for most of its four years existence.

Lents Friend's Church has always been conducted on the evangelistic lines, and has had the help and services, in the past few years, of some very efficient evangelists. Harry Hayes of Ills., held a very successful revival here a few years ago, and later Homer Cox, Pastor of the Friend's church at Sunnyside, also James Crook and wife of Chicago.

Soon after taking charge of the work here, Mr. Riley and wife (who is also a minister) held a special two week's meeting. At all these meetings there were a number of conversions and accessions to the church, so that we now have a membership of one-hundred and fifty.

With our increased membership and large Sunday School, our present place of worship is entirely inadequate, so that the necessity of a larger and more commodious building is very pressing, and we are looking forward to advanced steps in that direction.

At the present time, special services are being held every evening, with Evangelist O. B. Ong of Pasadena, Cal., in charge. The public is cordially invited to these meetings.
