Doings of Our Neighbors

BREEZY ITEMS CONTRIBUTED BY HERALD REPORTERS AT NEARBY POINTS

CHERRYVILLE

To-morrow is Good Friday. Plant your potatoes.
 Go to church Sunday, which is Easter Sunday, and if you are a lady look at the display of millinery.
 Everybody rushing the spring work and more than delighted with the lovely spring weather.
 Special Easter services here at the church on Easter Sunday. Preaching by the Rev. Mr. Runyan.
 Mrs. Lehnfeld and her daughter, Mrs. Woodstock, of Portland, are down looking after their property south of town. They expect to live on the Marsten place 3 miles south of town this summer in hopes the change will be beneficial to the health of Mrs. Woodstock.

The Dooley Brothers of Albany, Ore., were in this vicinity last Saturday looking after a claim left to them by their uncle, James Curry, who took up a homestead about three miles east and south of Cherryville a good many years ago. This tract of 160 acres is heavily timbered and is cruised at 13,000,000 feet. The taxes on it this year were \$211.00 and no inconsiderable item for a piece of non-productive property. If all the timber land in the county paid this much tax, Clackamas county would be out of debt.

Kellogg Thayer of Dover was in town last week and says there will be a meeting of the railroad land squatters at the home of T. Koenicker, near Firwood, on Easter Sunday at 1 o'clock p. m. Kellogg says there is nearly 4,000,000 acres of land tied up in the state by bogus railroad land grants and snide military road grants, and that there is over 13,000,000 acres of land tied up in forest reserves.

The school exercises at the school house last Friday night were very much appreciated by those present and consisted of vocal and instrumental music by the teacher, recitations, readings and dialogues by the scholars. More interest ought to be shown in these entertainments and not so much time given to dances and card playing.
 Steps have been taken to start a coffin factory as a saw mill is idle here at this time and there are thousands of cedar logs and stumps in every direction. The coffin trust is selling flimsy and worthless coffins at from \$40 to \$150 that do not last but a very few years, while these cedar coffins have been taken up sound after being in the ground 30 years.

Messers Turner & Ritzer of Boring have traded their house and lot in Boring for the homestead and shingle mill of Frank Rhodes, three miles south of this place and have already taken possession. They intend to pile up a lot of shingles for the season's trade. There is practically no end to the cedar logs and stumps here in every direction, especially on the bogus railroad land grant.
 Glenn Rugh, who has been ill for the past year, departed this life at his home two miles east of here last Monday at 3 o'clock p. m. He was born at Rock Island 38 years ago and was one of the five boys of W. O. Rugh by his first wife. He was of an unusual even temper and was cheerful and hopeful to the last. He leaves a wife and two step-children here besides a father, step-mother, brother and two step-sisters. The funeral services were conducted at the cemetery here by Rev. Runyan on Wednesday afternoon in the presence of relatives and friends.

THE HOT WATER CURE FOR ROSES.

"Boiling water will revive flowers that are so wilted that almost anyone would throw them away as worthless," says a woman in the New York Sun. She was scraping down the limp stems of some full-blown roses that drooped dejectedly. "I am doing this lightly, you see," she continued, "so that the hot water will soak all through the stems."

After she had finished the scraping, she put the flowers into a deep pitcher, went to the stove, and took from it the steaming hot-water kettle. Then she poured the hot water into the pitcher until it just covered the stems, and left the roses above the surface. "There! In a few minutes I shall have fresh flowers for the dinner table," she said. And her visitor saw just what she had prophesied—a mass of roses that looked as if they had never thought of wilting.
 "I always try the boiling water cure on roses before I throw them away," she concluded. "Very few people know about it. You mustn't lay the flowers themselves in the hot water. Just let it cover the stems."
