BAD News comes from Corvallis. The Board of Regents have about decided to raise the standard for applicants for entrance. That will mean a pupil will have to have more advanced work before he can get into the college, thus the boy from the county schools will find himself handicapped. He will be required to go through a preparatory course or stay at home. In the end, town boys and girls, who have had high school advantages, will be the ones who will fill the agricultural school and when they are done their education they will return to the towns from which they sprang, thus again limiting advanced training to those who already have the best advantages.

ONE of the amusing features of the "call" made last week for the desirable candidates for the legislature was that the call was issued after the candidates were selected by four or five self appointed bosses. Another is that some of the 100 were never consulted. And still another is that some of them had not been in the state long enough to vote. And of course Abigail Scott was in it. She is too close to some of the bosses to avoid that. One would think that Bowerman, Pipher, Littlefield, and others, had learned the mortality of the assembly.

The Herald is glad to see Mr. T. M. Hurlburt in the race for sheriff. The time is ripe for new blood in the sheriff's office. All the other candidates have had experience of a nature that suggests the need of some one who is not wedded to past experience. What we need in the sheriff's office is less bluff, less eccentricity, less policy and less alleged "graft" than has been the rule for the past few years. Mr. Hurlburt comes of good stock, has been tried, is of known reliability, and that is what we all want.

There are several gentlemen in Multnomah county who think they can live on \$7500 a year, and two trips across the country at 20 cents a mile. They think they can do it without asking for the mileage on a trip they did not make. But then Lafferty spent several months of his time in Europe. Two trips across the U. Corn

The corn plant consists of a stalk, leaves, blossoms, and grows several feet high. The stalk is composed of joints several inches apart and looks like bamboo, from which fishing poles are made. The leaves are long and slender. They branch off from the stalk and have a sharp point. We call the top of the corn the tassel, which furnishes the pollen that feeds the little blossoms found between the leaf and the stalk where the ears grow.

The ear of corn has a covering called the husk, it has kernels and a cob. It grows between the stalk and the leaves. The covering, or husk protects the ear of corn from the sun and worms. The kernels are arranged in rows side by side along the ear of corn.

Corn is raised in nearly all countries, but nine-tenths of it is raised in the seven corn states. Corn should be planted in May because the frost will be out of the ground as it is a very tender plant. The corn plant should be cultivated when it is several inches high. We commence to harvest corn about the middle of September but it does not hurt to leave it in the ground longer.

Corn is very useful for man and beast. It can be made into cornmeal, hominy, cornstarch, and other useful things for mankind. The cattle like to eat the fodder made from corn when green. They like it very much.
