Again we are reminded that a considerable number of people think a newspaper is under obligations to give its space to promoting people who never contribute to its support. Just how we are to exist when every Tom, Dick and Harry, wants free space for a little promotion enterprise of their own is not clear. Neither can we see how anyone with a conscience, who has received favors of this sort, can spend his time criticising the policy of the paper, and when they have a little job work done they hunt the town over for a 25 cent cut on price.

WITH his customary high sightedness our esteemed contemporary, the Spectator, attempts to answer a paragraph we issued recently. We say high sightedness. Perhaps near-sightedness or far sightedness, or astigmatism would do just as well. The worthy "Spectator" holds its head so high that it fails to see more than half the facts that might be observed if the "Spectator" got a complete view of things. In proof of this we call attention to the "Spectator's" statement that "The fight made by the Mt. Scott News," etc. Now the Mt. Scott News has been defunct for three months. If the Spectator quill driver can look a publication over and make such gross mistakes as that, what can you expect of him in talking about matters so distant as Seattle, of so far beneath his fair consideration as a petty public market. As a further proof of his majestic degeneracy we call attention to some hundred vacant grocery shops in Portland today, and to other hundreds of shops that are now conducted by Japanese and Chinese and Italians and Greeks and French and Englishmen and a few Americans.

Business conditions have not heretofore prevented these various nationalities and why should it be cited that the opening of public markets will increase the proportion of Japanese or Chinese merchants. We doubt if Seattle has as many vacant store buildings today as Portland. We have not seen it proven that Seattle has a larger percent of Mongolian tradesmen than Portland. The mere statement by the "Spectator" that such is true does not make it so and in the view of numerous other unwarranted statements it makes we are inclined to the view that the Spectator man is again holding his nose too high.

The farmer who sells eggs on the Albina market at 20 cents while grocers are getting 25 cents is helping to pay the grocer bill. Why? Because the housewife who saves on one commodity is the better able to pay for another. If the householders are able to save 20 percent on the garden or farm produce they purchase they will be 20 percent better able to pay for flour, canned goods, other provisions or dry goods and hence the merchants will lose fewer bills and be just 20 percent better off.

### State Press Comment On Candidacy Of C. N. McArthur For Congress

Clifton N. McArthur, who made such an excellent record as Speaker of the House of the last legislative session, is a candidate for Congress in the Third District with a good chance of being the next Congressional representative from Portland. He is a staunch Republican, talented, and has given full demonstration of being a man of his word and faithful to the letter to the people's interests. Added to his many enviable qualifications is his well-known common

sense. His platform should appeal to every voter of Portland, and the large majority should unhesitatingly give him their support, for Oregon needs a man of his calibre and impressions in Congress.

The fact that he has filled the chair of Speaker of the Oregon Legislature for two terms and come out stronger and more highly respected each time, is proof that he is a man whom the people can trust in the conduct of their business. After a service of more than six years as a Circuit judge in Multnomah county, C. U. Gantenbein has again entered the race and is a candidate for the Republican nomination for Judge of Department Six.
