**INFLUENCE OF COWS' FEED ON FLAVOR OF MILK**

**There Is Little or No Difference Between Several Kinds of Good Feeds in Producing Fine-Flavored Milk.**

The Department of Agriculture recently reported the result of experiments to test the effect of oats on the flavor of milk. These experiments showed that oats do not have the beneficial effect on the flavor of milk which many dairymen believe. But as corn and bran constituted the ration tested against oats, the public has gained the impression erroneously that the Department recommends the feeding of corn and bran to improve the flavor of milk. Of 50 opinions expressed regarding the flavor of the samples, 25 preferred the milk from cows fed corn and bran. As 16 preferred the milk from cows fed oats and 9 expressed no choice, it does not appear that either ration has any decided advantage over the other. There can be no great superiority in the bran and corn when one-half of the opinions were either indifferent or were in favor of the other milk. In view of these experiments the Department does not recommend the feeding of bran and corn to improve the flavor of milk. Oats, corn, alfalfa hay, cottonseed meal, linseed meal, bran, gluten and other good feeds for dairy cows, when properly fed in reasonable amounts, produce a fine-flavored milk, but there is no substantial evidence that any one of them is superior to any of the others in this respect.

The relative prices of the different feeds will determine in most cases which are to be preferred in making a ration for dairy cows.

**DEHORNING CALVES**

What chemical is used in dehorning calves, and how?

Caustic potash is generally used by applying it to the "button" as soon as it can be felt beneath the skin of the head. Clip the hair away over the budding horn and moisten an area as large as a cent. With a stick of caustic potash wrapped in paper to protect the fingers, rub the moistened area well all over the button. Be careful and do not make the place so wet that the caustic will run over the skin in the least, but let it be confined strictly to the area over the button. If properly done a thick scab will never grow. Do not attempt to remove the horns in this way after they have begun to push through the skin, for it will only make a useless sore.

**TURKEY BREEDING**

The male may be a yearling or older. Strength, health and vigor, with well proportioned medium size are the main points of excellence. Always use as breeds turkey hens over one year old. Be sure they are strong, healthy and vigorous, and of good medium size. Do not strive to have them unnaturally large.

New blood is of vital importance. Better send a thousand miles for a new male than to run the chances of interbreeding. Secure females from one locality and the males from another to insure non-relationship.

For mating have four or five females to one male. When they are yarded and from eight to ten females are kept, it is better to keep two toms and have one shut up while the other is with the hens, changing them at least twice a week.

**Management on Stormy Days.**

I keep my hens shut in on stormy days and feed them table scraps and a little corn or crumbs in the ashes as they are lifted. This is put in their dust box, and keeps them busy until 9 or 10 o'clock. Then they are given a light feed, peelings boiled and thickened with bran or corn meal. After this they are given several cans of litter from the entryway of the barn (this contains a good many whole grains of oats and corn). After dinner they have turnips chopped up or a rabbit. At night they have all they can eat of shelled corn. In severe weather, it is warmed or somewhat charred for them. Water is given often and milk, too, when it is plenty.

**Cures 99 Roup Cases Out of 100.**

I will give you a sure cure for roup. Catch the sick fowls and pour down the mouth of each a tablespoonful of coal oil, with as much quinine as a No. 2 capsule holds, dissolved in the oil. Some will no doubt think this dose will kill the fowl, but it won't and 99 cases out of 100 will get well, if you get it down them. I have cured at least 100 and lost only one, and many of ours were too near dead to stand or sit up. A few drops of turpentine put on the top of the head is also a good thing in bad cases, but pull out a few feathers before applying turpentine.
