To the Editor: Last year the night school was a decided success and over a hundred pupils were enjoying the benefits at the time the school was discontinued. This year there has been many inquiries from those wishing to attend night school. The patrons of Lents school feel that the people of this section will be denied the advantages of this education unless a night school is established at Lents, for the time and carfare prohibit their attendance at the Arleta school.

The following petition has been presented to the Board of Education by the Lents Parent-Teacher Club:

To the Honorable Board of Education, Portland, Oregon. Gentlemen—In response to a strong demand in this community, the Parent-Teacher Association of Lents respectfully requests a continuance during this winter of the night school opened here last year. The school was a decided success, and already applications for admission are coming in. At the present time, an attendance of over one hundred is assured. Interest is especially keen in the elementary course and the commercial course.

The night school at Arleta is of no service to this community, on account of its distance from us. Additional carfare is a consideration to the working people who desire to attend night school, and moreover, as few of them reach their homes after work before seven o'clock, they could not possibly get dinner and get back to Arleta in time for school.

We therefore earnestly request that night school sessions continue to be held in our own school building.
