WARSHIPS IN DUEL

British Dreadnaught Drives Turkish Cruiser From Strait.

Salvos of Monster Shells Sweep High Over Ridges of Gallipoli at Dardanelles-Aviator Directs the Fire.

By LOUIS EDGAR BROWNE, (Correspondent of the Chicago News.) Mudros, Allies' Near Eastern Base .-The Queen Elizabeth and the Goeben have been engaged in battle with each other. The great British dreadnaught, the most powerful battleship affoat, attacked the Goeben under most extraordinary conditions. Although the Queen Elizabeth fired salvos of gigantio highly explosive projectiles, the Goeben escaped unhit.

Since the allies' forces landed at the Pardanelles late in April the German-Turkish battle cruiser has seriously hampered the advance toward their goal-Constantinople. 
