Farragut's Way.

While preparations were being made for the attack on New Orleans, the navy department came into possession of a complete set of plans of the defenses of that city. Not only were the positions of the forts laid down, but also, the submarine mines, as well as the system of torpedoes, and the reserve of war vessels which were to cooperate with the land batteries. No time was lost in sending it to Admiral Farragut, but no acknowledgment ever reached the navy department. Meanwhile the passage of the forts was effected. New Orleans captured, Admiral Farragut in due time went north. Proceeding to Washington, he at once called at the navy department, where he received hearty congratulations upon his brilliant successes. While he was in the department a prominent official referred to the plans of the defenses of New Orleans and asked the admiral if he had ever received them. "Yes," he replied, "I received the plans, but on examination I found out that, according to them, New Orleans could never be taken. So I tore them up and threw them into the waste basket."—Argonaut.

Once more the skies are overcast. These rolling clouds are not appreciated by the hay-makers.

There was another big run of autos and motorcycles a week ago Saturday and Sunday almost equal to the 3d and 4th of July. It is estimated that 800 machines passed through here.

That giant corporation, the S. P. railroad, now say that unless congress will allow them to sell the timber off from the so-called land grant they will carry the case into court again. Having broken the law and defied the courts for a great many years they think they can continue to do so. The company knew the manner in which these lands were to be sold and nobody is fooled by this talk of innocent purchasers.

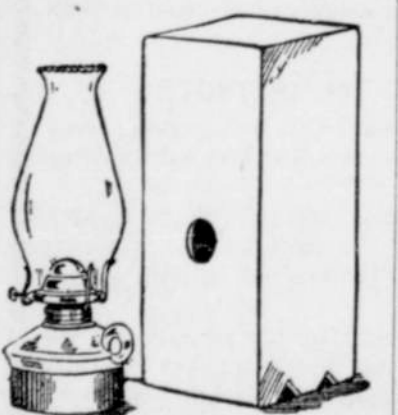
Mrs. E. J. Spooner has been entertaining her sister and her husband, Mr. and Mrs. Ferguson of Wisconsin.

Simple Candling Outfit.

In spite of the greatest care it will sometimes happen under ordinary farm conditions that an occasional bad egg will appear among those sent to market. It would be wise to candle every egg shipped. Candling is "the process of testing eggs by passing light through them so as to reveal the condition of the contents." A simple candling outfit may be made of an ordinary pasteboard box, sufficiently large to be placed over a small hand lamp after the ends have been removed. The box should have a hole cut in it on a level with the flame of the lamp. Several notches should be cut in the edges on which the box rests to supply air to the lamp. The box ought to be sufficiently large to prevent danger from catching fire. The box should be made of corrugated pasteboard, but ordinary pasteboard will serve the purpose. Candling is done in the dark, or at least away from strong light, and the egg is held against the hole in the side of the box, when its condition may be seen. An egg that shows any defect should not be marketed.



Keep the hens supplied with a dust bath, and a little insect powder mixed with the dust will have its good effect. Do not let your young birds roost with the old hens, as they are liable to catch diseases which old hens are more subject to. The finest remedy for scaly legs is to dip the parts affected in a solution of equal parts of sweet oil and coal oil, in which has been mixed one or two handfuls of sulphur.

Chicken Wisdom.

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Lime Sulphur Solution.

A lime-sulphur solution is now considered one of the most useful of the spray materials employed by fruit growers. It serves the double purpose of an insecticide and a fungicide. It is especially desirable in the control of the San Jose scale, peach leaf curl and apple scab.
