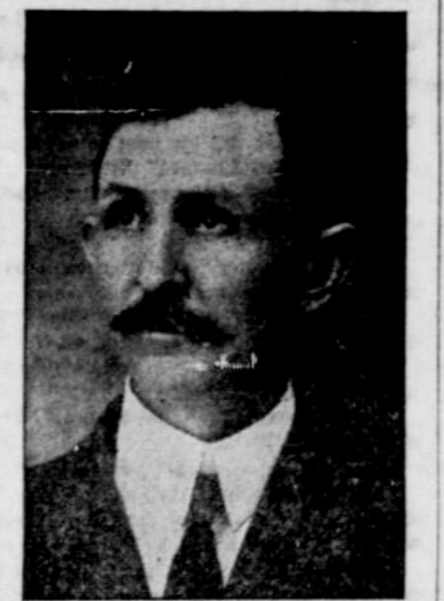
Mrs. Maffet underwent an operation
