Sheriff Takes Over Kelly Butte

Since Sheriff Hurlburt took over Kelly Butte, the county's prison quarry, he has introduced new methods in the administration of the penal plant—methods that are mixed with humanity and practical ethics and economics. The prisoners there break rock for the county roads and highways as punishment for misdemeanors.

Under the Hurlburt system they are being paid a small daily sum for efficiency, so that when discharged, they will have a few dollars in their pocket to aid them to an honest job or to go elsewhere. The effect of this inducement has been salutary among the sheriff's charges already. They work with better heart. There is no disposition to shirk. They are given wholesome, good food and plenty of it. It is well cooked and served.

Also they are given a sanitary place to work in as well as to live and eat in. There are also newspapers and periodicals and books for those who want to read during idle time. The entire spirit of the prison has been changed. The prisoners have established the "honor" system among themselves. Violation of the rules they make for themselves is an offense that their Kelly Butte league or Kangaroo court discipline in their own way.

The same humane treatment and surroundings are found in the county jail, which the sheriff inaugurated when he took charge eighteen months ago. It has the reputation of being one of the best managed and conducted prisons on the Pacific coast, according to prison experts who have investigated it. Kelly Butte is articulated with the county jail. Fifty prisoners are kept on the rock pile. As they are discharged, others are sent out from the jail. The eagerness of the jail inmates to get out and work at Kelly Butte has caused the making of a "waiting" list by Sheriff Hurlburt. So the rock pile is popular. It is making men of criminals. That is what the sheriff is doing in a constructive way for the "boys" whose toes have slipped for the nonce.

And while he is putting a little sunshine into prison life, he is doing it in the way that is most effective and constructive and practical. He is also enforcing the laws. The people enacted the prohibition statute. How well he is enforcing that law is evidenced by his record of raids of joints since the statute became operative on January 1, last. Today Multnomah county has the reputation of being the driest balliwick on the Pacific Northwest, according to those who know.

Sheriff Hurlburt is a candidate for re-nomination and re-election. Here is his platform. "If nominated and elected I will enforce the law. I will have no interest to serve but the public interest; I will conduct my office with strict regard for economy. I will give all prisoners in my custody humane treatment and wholesome food."

A member of Congress has introduced a bill lately to take over the whole Standard Oil Co., and a recent issue of a prominent newspaper contains the following statement: "The Standard Oil companies, the combinations affiliated with interests that were condemned by the courts and ordered dissolved, have grossly deceived the people, betrayed a trust, defied the law; it is time for them to go. The companies associated with them, or engaged in the same manner of business, and pursuing the same methods, are in the same class. The existence of one and all of them is contrary to sound public policy. They have had their opportunity and they have abused it. It is time for them to get out, time for them to be put out, of business."

Portland has allowed the great grain business that ought to come naturally to her market to be taken over by Tacoma and Seattle, and they are getting but a small share of the Alaska business which is enriching the business men of all the Sound cities. If they could get rid of some of the old moss-backs in Portland it would be of great advantage to that city.

Only a few days now until the Republican Convention at Chicago and every day makes it more clear that Roosevelt will be the nominee. The American people can view with some degree of satisfaction his nomination from the fact that he has many elements of greatness in him, and his high courage and mighty grasp of affairs the world over makes him in many ways a natural leader of men. He is the only President we ever had, who said this world would not be very good long for any of us unless it is good for all of us.

During the bright days last week, great numbers of steelhead salmon came up the fish ladder at the dam and were taken for spawning. Everybody had a fish-try last week as these fish are given to any one who comes after them.

The Accident Map.

On the walls of a room at police headquarters in New York city are large maps of the five boroughs. These maps are covered with many large and small pins of various colors. Each color denotes a particular kind of accident. The large headed pins represent fatal accidents and the small ones minor accidents. For example, a large white headed pin represents a fatal automobile accident, while a small one of the same color represents a similar but not serious accident. In the same manner a large green headed pin indicates a fatal trolley car accident. The map of Manhattan shows that a long stretch of Fifth avenue has an almost continuous line of accidents. The Thirtieth precinct shows a greater number of accidents than any other. This precinct contains Delancey street, with the approach to the Williamsburg bridge and many narrow east side streets.—Safety Engineering.
