Candidate for Re-election for Second Term



Less than a year ago Judge
Cleeton became Juvenile
Judge by an act of the leg-
islature. Since becoming
Juvenile Judge he has had
brought before him for in-
vestigation over 1800 cases.
He has organized the work
along co-operative lines.
Has organized a home-
finding department. Dur-
ing this time there have
been 190 children placed in
good homes. Of this num-
ber over 100 have been re-
turned to their own homes.
The expense of operation of
the Juvenile Court has been
greatly reduced. During

the last ten months Judge Cleeton has saved the taxpayers
over \$7000 in this department of his work alone. The De-
tention Home has become merely a place of temporary
abode, as its name indicates. The number of inmates has
been reduced from 75 to 5, reducing the cost of operation
of the Home about \$5000 in the last ten months.
