HARVEST HANDS NEEDED.

Western States Call For Laborers to Aid In Gathering Crops. Bumper grain crops in the west are

demanding labor for the harvest. The labor distribution bureau of the United States department of labor has been advised that in Oklahoma 1,000 men will be needed in what is known as the "Panhandle district" and that in Kansas from 35,000 to 40,000 men will be required.

Wages in Oklahoma range from \$2 to \$3 a day with board. In Kansas ordinary hands will get from \$2 to \$3 a day; enginemen, \$3.50 to \$6 a day, and men with teams. \$4 to \$7 a day. Harvest in Oklahoma was started about June 18 and in Kansas about June 15.
