His friends will be glad to know that he, as the result of persistent effort and frequent rubbing can almost touch his face with the hand of the paralyzed arm. Next Sunday will be rally day for the Free Methodist Sunday School. A program of recitations and songs will be rendered. Members of this church who belong to the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Portland district have been busy engaged in preparing fruit to be sent to the four foreign fields: Japan, China, India and Africa. The doctor found trouble in the arm and quarantined the case.

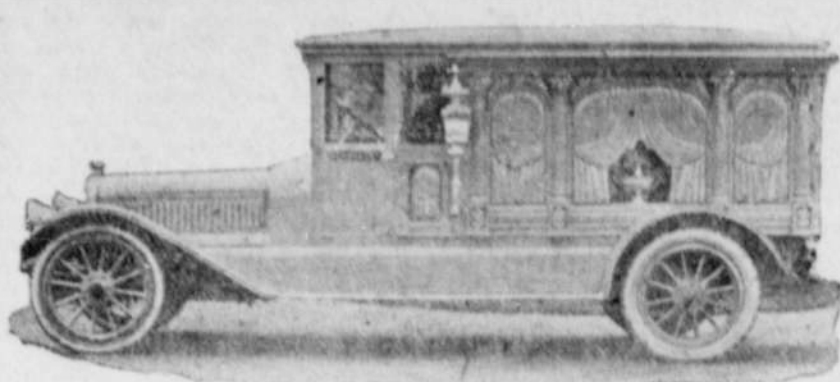
