## Municipal Electric Light Plants.

(Continued From Page 1.)

In a certain Coast city there was in operation both a municipal and private plant with the result that prices were repeatedly cut by the private company to compete with the municipal plant until less than half of the original price was being charged, the company making a profit even at that figure. Mr. Daly stated that Portland could install a plant at a very nominal rate. The city's experience with the water system was given as an example of what might be accomplished. The present indebtedness on the water plant is in the neighborhood of \$7,000,000, but the present income would warrant an indebtedness of \$18,000,000.

Mr. Wilson Benefield gave a very interesting address on the "Great Outdoors," showing the advantages to be derived from mixing play with work, which added to the enjoyment of life and detracted in no sense from general efficiency. Farmers should take time for pleasure trips and the cultivation of the social side of their nature and the enjoyment of family life.
