THE RED TRIANGLE A JOY TO SOLDIERS

At Camp Lewis, American Lake, Wash., where the drafted men of the new National army being assembled for training in the western department, the Army Y. M. C. A. buildings, thoroughly equipped and splendidly manned, are awaiting the thousands that are arriving daily. Tons upon tons of writing paper and envelopes are within reach, books and magazines have been carefully laid out, well lighted buildings with ample facilities for writing letters home, for recreation and comfort, are completed and everything is free.

Wherever American troops are sent this same welcome awaits the soldier. The sign of the Red Triangle of the Y. M. C. A. means that within the walls of the building a friendly welcome awaits the soldier, that everything in the building is at his disposal and there are no don'ts and no dues.

The secretaries are efficient, trained men who strive to please him, to look after his comfort, to advise and cheer him. It is a place where he may go when he is homesick or weary and find genuine comrades, where he may take his money for deposit, where he will meet clean fellows with clean thoughts.

Whatever the Army and Navy Y. M. C. A. can do to make a man physically, morally and mentally fit for service to his country, it is striving to do. Educational classes are instituted for those who desire to improve their leisure hours. There is religious inspiration for those who seek it. There is healthy recreation for those who wish it. The Y. M. C. A. is a great club of the enlisted men. It is open to them all no matter what their creed. It is the bureau of information in every camp and cantonment, the center from which radiates all the physical and social activities. It is the nearest thing to home that the enlisted men will find in the army.

Delegations from Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming and Utah will be in attendance. This will be the first conference of the kind ever held in the Northwest. A mass meeting will be held on Monday evening, the 15th, with addresses by the best informed men in the country, and illustrative motion pictures and music.

While not in any sense showy, the convention, it is said, will be one of the most important ever held in the Pacific Northwest.

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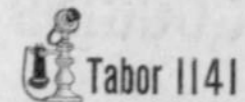
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
