NON-RECEIPT OF PAPERS NOT ACCEPTED AS EXCUSE

Every Registered Man Must Answer

Portland, Ore., Dec. 4.—Every man under the draft who has changed his postoffice address must immediately notify his local board of his present address so that he will receive the Questionnaire.

This applies to all registered men, even those previously exempted. All previous exemptions and discharges are automatically revoked December 15.

The Questionnaires will begin to be sent to registered men on December 15. Each man will have seven days to fill out answers to the questions asked and return the Questionnaire to his local board. Failure to endanger a man's right to claim exemption. Hence it is urgent that every registered man whose address has been changed should at once notify his local board of his change in address.

Registrants are bound by law to keep themselves advised of all proceedings in respect of them, and failure to do so may result in their losing right to claim exemption or discharge. —Adjutant General's Office, 648 Morgan Building.

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
