**Origin Of Catsup.**

No more need one expose ignorance when asked what catsup, or ketchup means, or what was its origin. Here it is:

It seems reasonably certain that the original form of the word when first taken into the English language was Ketchup, and this was derived either from the Malay or Chinese about the year 1711, when the English first begin trading in far Eastern waters. The Malay form was "Kechap," meaning a condiment, and the Chinese form, not however using their letters, was "Koechiap," meaning a brine of pickled fish. It has come to be used and much prized as the name of a relish made chiefly of mushrooms, tomatoes, walnuts, vinegar and spices. Here is a Catsup Omelet recipe:

Fry three slices of bacon crisp, remove it, and in the same fat cook one sliced onion until light brown. Beat three eggs, add three tablespoonfuls of Tomato Catsup thickened with finely broken crackers, the fried onions and crisp bacon finely crumbled. Turn into greased chafing pan, and pick it up with a fork as the egg thickens, then let it color slightly, roll over and turn out on to a hot platter.
