Realizing that the present Food Control Law fails to fix the prices on many necessities of life, Senator McNary has introduced and is working strongly for a bill extending price-fixing to a large number of commodities. Explaining its purpose, Senator McNary said:

"During the consideration of the Food Control Bill I took the position that the law, to be effective, should be comprehensive in its application to prevent profiteers from gaining control of those commodities not coming within its operation. This Bill will, if it passes, correct some of the wrongs now practiced upon the producing and consuming public. This measure empowers the President to fix the price of Petroleum and its products, hides and skins and their products, such as shoes, hemp, jute, cotton and wool and their products, such, for example, as clothing, and also on wheat substitutes, corn, rye, barley, oats and the products or joint products for products of two or more of said materials, also on livestock and its products. Farm implements and machinery are also included. Unless a change of policy is made, it is inevitable that the price of wheat substitutes will advance until actual suffering will come upon many people."

**Patriotic Work.**

Sent to Oregon Boys—17,000 dish towels, 1500 housewives, 600 comfort bags. The demand for these far exceeds the supply.

Sent to Vancouver Hospital—20 pairs knitted socks, 40 glasses of jelly, 95 scrap books.

Sent to the Red Cross and War Relief Association—300 pairs of knitted socks, 100 sweaters, 15 helmets, 8812 arm and leg bandages, 200 ambulance pillows, 2021 Serbian quilt squares, 5000 leaflets urging the foreign born to study American language and become naturalized, 25 mothers' meetings for foreign mothers.

**Aiding with Funds**—Field kitchens in France; stereomicrographs for cantonments, patriotic home for soldiers' wives at Camp Lewis; furnishing hospitals with electric fans; quantities of surgical dressings, gun wipes; hospital supplies and all kinds of articles needed; 8 French orphans are being supported; 1746 patterns of housewives, comfort bags and bandage patterns have been sent out.
