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MORAL COURAGE.

We are inclined, as a rule, if we think about it at all, to believe that we possess a high sense of moral courage and we are actually put to the test. It is so easy for us to criticize the actions of others, to draw contrasts between their way of performing a duty and the way in which we would perform it, and to denounce some particular show of moral weakness without considering how we would act in similar conditions. We do not care very much about moral courage as long as we are not called upon to exercise it, but take for granted that whenever the test comes we shall not be lacking. It is one thing to theorize about probable tests, however, and quite a different matter to put these theories into actual operation, and it is a fact that unless a man is by nature courageous and fair-minded he will most likely be unable to meet the requirements of the ordeal imposed upon him. As a matter of fact, we often doubt the necessity of ever having to demonstrate our moral courage, and look upon the quality as something to be kept in reserve for an emergency, says Charleston News and Courier. We learn however that this sort of courage is the only foundation for strength of character; upon it we build for the future, and in proportion to its firmness and its power to resist evil influences do we mold ourselves into worthy men and good citizens. Without the courage to think for ourselves, to work for ourselves and to dare for ourselves in the fear and love of God, life would be burdensome and our work meaningless.

What tremendous problems will be before the people when peace returns and life gets back to its own. These are the problems of transportation, labor, profiteering, military rule, temperance, selfish politics, vice, divorce, taxation, class legislation, the public service, sinecures and others equally important that the people will have to face when the war is over, says Ohio State Journal. And there is this, too, about them, that the war has greatly changed their character and created new relations to society about them all, so that they will provide absolute conditions of our peace and progress. They cannot resume their ancient attitude toward the world. There will be started a new deal and all these problems will be solved so as to obtain their new footing in the coming order of things. All these problems will be vastly changed in their scope and import.

The first of the new type of submarine chasers known as eagleboats is scheduled for launching in June. A pattern boat, which is nearly completed, is to have a shore trial of its engines next week. It is announced that the rate of output is expected to be a boat a day when the work of construction gets under full swing. The man who was financially responsible for the Rosika Schwimmer expedition is not slow in the production of war material now that he recognizes the winning of the war by the allies as a necessary preliminary to a stable peace.

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
