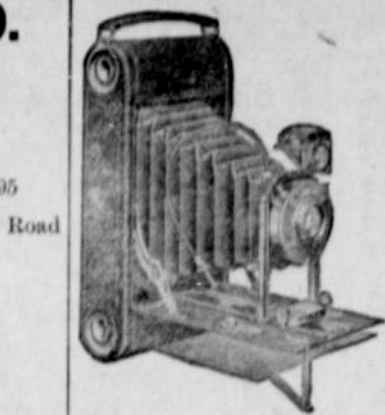

FROM OVER THE STATE

A 1200-acre tract southeast of Elgin recently sold for \$60,000.

A wool clip of 50,000 pounds has been shipped from Elko to Boston.

A carload of pedigree cattle has been received by Cooley & McCart of Harrisburg.

The Roseburg Canning Company has ordered machinery to install a \$10,000 canning plant.

Keep on eating potatoes until the old ones are all gone. They won't keep and the new ones will.

Both yards at Marshfield will begin the construction of 5000 ton ships soon. The next keels laid will be of this type.

Another large sawmill has been installed at Toledo which will have a cutting capacity of 50,000 feet of lumber daily.

Road work is progressing on the Pacific Highway between Oregon City and Canby. A force of 110 men is employed.

Two sawmills are operating at Umpqua, and they expect to do a large amount of business during the remainder of the year.

The Red Cross workers of Newport have recently sent a 900-pound shipment of sphagnum moss to Corvallis for use in making surgical dressings for United States soldiers.

The Oregon Development Bureau has purchased sixty acres near Independence for development of a model farm. When the land has reached the highest state of cultivation it will be disposed of to some home seekers.

Among the speakers who addressed the people at the annual pioneers' picnic at Brownsville, beginning June 5, were Governor Withycombe, Dr. J. W. Kerr, president of the Oregon Agricultural College, and Hon. Walter Pierce, of La Grande.

The Western Spar Company of Portland is furnishing Willamette & Columbia Iron Works all booms for iron masts, also booms and masts for Ferris type ships being built by Wilson Bros and Rodgers shipyards at Astoria. This is a new industry for Oregon which will bring money to the state from many foreign sources.

One patriotic farmer near Gresham sent back seventeen sacks of flour. He was not a hoarder with a stricken conscience, but a thrifty agriculturist who bought forty sacks of flour early last fall for a year's supply. He has put his family on a substitute ration while the flour shortage lasts.—Gresham Outlook.

Parched pastures, aphids in the Willamette Valley, high cost of feed for cows and high water along the Columbia are ascribed by the Oregon Dairymen's League as reasons for increasing the price of milk to distributors from \$3 to \$3.50 a hundred pounds, effective June 20. The announcement of the increase was made by Alma D. Kats, president of the league, June 13.

At Hepper the first real summer weather of the season arrived last week, and the farmers and stockmen of that locality are pleased. While rain is beginning to be needed, but little damage has been done by lack of moisture. Shepherds are busy getting their sheep to the mountains this week, and farmers are also busy getting ready for what is expected to be the biggest harvest ever gathered in Morrow county.

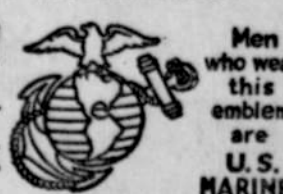
