year!"

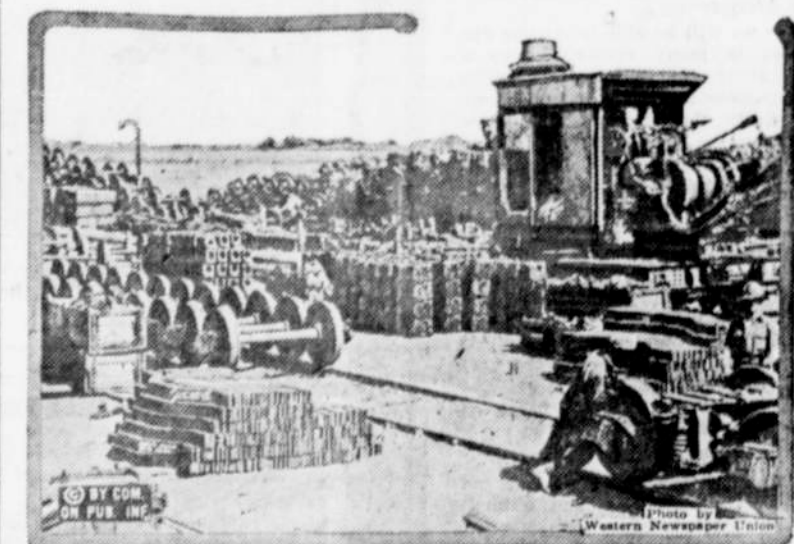
Missed his voice last Chris-

Valuable Compounds Discovered.
Crystalline selenium, in which light produces so remarkable a lessening of electrical resistance proves to be not the only substance so affected. In the experiments of the United States bureau of standards to determine precisely the properties of different materials, such compounds as Jamesonite, cylindrite, silver sulphide, bismuthinite, bouingerite, stibnite and molybdenite showed some change in electrical conductivity with varying light in the same way as the element selenium.

DR. PANG-YUEN TSEO



Dr. Pang-Yuen Tseo, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Ling Han Tseo of Non-chang, China, has started work as an ambulance surgeon on the medical staff of Bellevue hospital, New York. Doctor Tseo was sent to this country by the Chinese educational commission in 1909. Although a young woman, she has been through the Northwestern university at Evanston, Ill., and in June of this year she completed a three-year course in medicine at the University of Chicago.
