## BUY AT HOME

If you need groceries, patronize the local grocery. If you need bread, buy it of the local bakery. If you need drugs, patronize the local drug store. If you need a suit of clothes, buy it of the local tailor. If you need tires for your automobile, buy them of the local garage. If your wife wants a new bonnet have her buy it of the local milliner. If you need a house, see the local real estate men. If you need a doctor or a dentist, call the local practitioners. If you need shoes or shirts or furniture, buy them of local dealers. If you need hardware, buy it of the local hardware store. If you have money to deposit, put it in the local bank. Not all of these lines are represented in the advertising columns of The Herald but they are all here, and by inquiry you will be able to locate those who do not advertise.

Following out the same line of reasoning, if you need printing or advertising, patronize the local newspaper. The business man who does not patronize his fellow business men shows that he is interested in the district only to the extent that the district will pour revenue into his pockets. He wants the other fellow to boost his business but considers that the obligation ends there.

## TREATIES TO PREVENT WAR

"It is said that it is unconstitutional for the treaty making power to agree, on behalf of the United States, not to make war. If this be unconstitutional, then the present senate has violated the constitution twenty times, for it has already agreed in twenty different treaties with the other nations of the world not to begin war until one year after the occurrence of the event upon which war may ensue, and until after a commission of inquiry into the subject matter of the dispute shall have been had and a report made. Did this violate the constitution? Did this deprive congress of the power to make war in accord with its constitutional authority? If it did, it violated the constitution, but it did not do anything of the sort."—William Howard Taft.

## KEPT MOTHER TONGUE

War revealed an astonishing condition in many parts of the United States, which the bureau of naturalization has just made public. A statement by the bureau dealing with the growth of foreign institutions in this country says:

"Section after section of the country has been disclosed as being under the domination not of American institutions of government, but of the most inimical forms of foreign autocracy. In many cities children by the thousands have been found who have not been allowed the inherent right to speak in the English tongue. They have been taught a foreign language. They have been disciplined for failure to use the foreign tongue. They have been trained to sing the patriotic airs of countries other than the country of their birth. They have been taught so that they would grow up to a firm conviction that righteous government alone could be achieved by some other form than that which is created and carried on by all of us."
