The work of the teachers in complying with the Oregon state law on "temperance" instruction in the schools is aided by the articles which the editors of the state teachers' magazine are using from W. C. T. U. sources.

The Ladies' Aid society of the Millard Avenue Presbyterian church made its annual report to the congregation Wednesday evening, April 2. Mrs. Jean F. McLoney, president of the society, made a general report, supplementing it by introducing Mrs. S. J. Merry, who has been active in promoting the philanthropic activities of the organization. Mrs. Merry reported in substance: During the fall and winter the ladies sent to the Woodmere Old People's Home 8 big comforters, 2 dresses, a number of undergarments, cloaks, coats, canned fruit, canned milk, and candy and oranges for Christmas. To the Albertina Kerr Baby Home they sent 18 quilts, 11 little made-over blankets, 120 little garments and two or three bundles of little wool stockings. Every alternate week from Mrs. Merry's, as headquarters, since fall, there has been sent some delicacy to the casuals at the Vancouver barracks. These delicacies have included apples, jellies, cookies, candy and cakes. The ladies have also sent flowers. It should be said that these activities are the result of a successful combination of Red Cross (under the Arleta W. C. T. U.) and Millard avenue interests, under the enthusiastic leadership of Mrs. S. J. Merry.

The Epworth League of the Laurelwood M. E. church was represented by about 18 people at the convention at the First Methodist church last Saturday night. Among those present, besides the pastor, Rev.
