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11,000 MEDALS TO BE GIVEN OVERSEAS SOLDIERS, SAILORS

June 12 has been declared by the directors of the Victory Rose Festival as a half holiday. The association is going to give the citizens and visitors the biggest surprise that has ever been accorded them. It will be something to talk about for years to come. The directors have made out their plans to have on that day the biggest, best and most spectacular military parade in the history of the city. All the returned soldiers from overseas will participate and 11,000 medals will be presented to sailors and soldiers who have served across the water. These medals will be given to them at the Festival Center by George L. Funk, city auditor, as the official representative of the city. Many other military organizations will also participate from Portland and surrounding towns. In fact, it is intended, if everything runs smoothly, to be the most gala day that the association has ever contemplated for the amusement and enjoyment of the public.

There will be warships in the harbor for the inspection of the people and free to all. There will be airships hovering over the city during the parade doing all kinds of stunts to the delight and wonderment of the old and young. There will be new march songs composed and especially selected by the committee on music from local talent, who will do their best in putting into music nothing but what is original and up to the minute for an occasion of this kind. Mayor Baker has been requested to issue a proclamation very shortly declaring June 12 a half holiday, and no doubt Governor Olcott will do the same for the state. It will be a glorious celebration and the name Victory Rose Festival will long be remembered by everyone who may have had the opportunity to be there.
