BIRDS HELP THE GARDENER

The importance of protecting our native birds is apparent when we consider that insects cost the American people approximately a billion dollars a year. A writer in Thrift magazine says a "recent examination of the stomach of a cedar wax wing (cherry bird) revealed 100 canker worms." In the stomach of a scarlet tanager were found 630 gypsy moth caterpillars.

Hawks and owls are birds of ill repute, yet it is estimated that a hawk or an owl kills an average of 1000 mice every year. Birds that feed on the seed of weeds, small rodents and insects are friends to the gardener. In their persistent quest of food they aid materially in conserving crops.

The wanton destruction of birds is both inhumane and an economic waste. Fortunately, many states have recognized the value of protecting man's feathered friends and sensible laws have been passed for that purpose. Alabama has an ably conducted fish and game department, presided over by John H. Wallace, who is recognized as an authority throughout the country.

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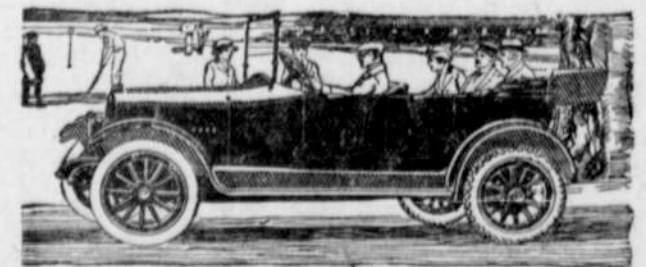
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
