STOP PRICE BOOSTING

In last week's issue we made mention of certain combines and gentlemen's round robins existing within the confines of this city.

Now Professor A. A. Knowlton of Reed College has taken up the cudgel and in a letter addressed to Mayor Baker urges the immediate attention of the authorities in stopping this illegal practice.

Professor Knowlton in his letter particularly mentions the proposed increase in the price of necessities of life, such as milk, bread, ice, coal, wood and shoes, and claims that if the perpendicular boost of prices continues through the organization of the producers and distributors for their own self protection it will naturally reach the consumers, who are not organized.

Mayor Baker says he will make an independent investigation and should such combines exist, he will take legal action to have them dissolved and put out of business. Mayor Baker will submit Professor Knowlton's letter to the city council this week and it is possible that the council will make some definite plans to check this practice. There is no doubt that should the daily fluctuation of prices continue to soar upward it will be the cause of constant social unrest among the people and the sooner it is placed in leash the better for all concerned. There is a limit.

POOR JUDGMENT

To some people this may be humorous, but it shows a certain deficiency

of judgment on the part of the judge who sentenced him. There are institutions in this free and enlightened country for just such cases. It is not the church, the schools or the universities or jails that act as an antidote against a disease of this kind, but a good cover for the fundamental knowledge of starting off the brain cells in their infancy and plenty of nourishment to the human body is what is required. The mind develops from what it consumes and to be well-balanced must not be allowed to dwell on one subject until it becomes warped and unbalanced.

NEIGHBORHOOD MEETING TO CONSIDER PROBLEMS

Residents Called to Consider Number Civic Civic Questions by City Planning Commission.

Property owners and residents of the following district between East Sixty-seventh street, Thorburn avenue and Mt. Tabor park on the west, and East Ninety-second street on the east, and between Division street (Section Line road) and the O.-W. R. & N. company's right of way met with the representatives of the Portland City Planning Commission in the Montavilla school at East Seventy-sixth and East Ash streets on Thursday, July 24, 1919, at 8 p. m., for the purpose of recommending limitations or restrictions on the use, height, and area of buildings that will be erected hereafter in the above district.

All property owners of the district were invited to be present as all are vitally interested in determining such questions as to where to locate residences, public garages, retail business, wholesale business, undertaking parlors, hospitals, apartments, dry-cleaning establishments, industries, etc., in the future.

A report from a committee of the property owners was submitted at the meeting.

Written communications from residents or property owners of said district should be filed with the city auditor within the next ten days and will be reviewed by the City Planning Commission.

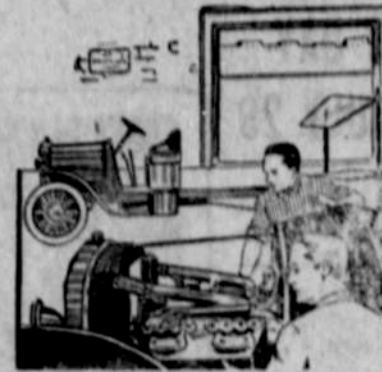
