EXTINGUISH CAMP FIRES

Residents of the district who take auto trips out into the country and camp out should be very careful about leaving campfires burning if they desire to escape arrest and consequent publishing of their names upon conviction. Publicity is being given by the U. S. forest service and other organizations which bear the burden of the forest fire fighting to successful prosecutions of campers who leave fires burning and cause forest blazes. As part of the campaign the daily newspapers are given details of every arrest and conviction of this nature, no matter in what part of the country the offense occurs. The first two prosecutions for fire trespass on the Oregon national forests this year occurred in Portland last month when D. L. French and G. R. French of Grants Pass were taken before the federal court in Portland and fined \$25 each for failure to extinguish a fire. The arrests were made by Ranger Stanley C. Walters of Zigzag, on Mount Hood.

SIXTY MILES IN FIFTY MINUTES

Showing the wide range of uses to which the airplane will be adapted to commercial and professional uses in the near future is the statement that doctors are becoming interested in their possibilities. Dr. Frank Brewster of Beaver City, Neb., already is using an airplane in his country practice. He is one of the best known surgeons in the middle west. He recently flew 60 miles to perform an operation, making the trip in 50 minutes. It would have required two and a half hours by automobile and more than four hours by train.

CITY COUNCIL APPROPRIATES \$25,000 FOR PAVING PLANT

At the regular meeting of the city council Wednesday two ordinances were passed, one providing a fund of \$25,000 for enlarging the city paving plant and the other making it possible for the city to bond property and put in paving with the city paving plant. Up to the present the city had no authority to follow this procedure except where bids were asked for from contracting firms. In cases where the city has done the work, as in the case of Ninety-second street, the consent of the property-owners had to be secured and the cost of the improvement collected before work could be commenced. It is estimated that the city will be able to eliminate from one-third to one-half the cost in paving.

The ordinance passed the council without a dissenting vote, the opposition to the city entering the paving business as voiced by Mayor Baker and Commissioner Pier not developing. This opposition, it was reported, had been eliminated at a council session behind locked doors Tuesday afternoon.

Commissioner Barbur explained that but \$10,000 of the money appropriated would be spent this year, but that he desired to have the money available before beginning his work. A new rock crusher, he said, would be installed and the old plant would be moved to the Jefferson street levee, which is the future home of the paving plant.

At the invitation of Commissioner Barbur, Marvin Hedge attended the meeting Wednesday to speak in favor of the proposition and testify to the satisfaction of the Lents district with the work done by the municipal paving plant on Ninety-second street.
