CITY COUNCIL APPROPRIATES \$25,000 FOR PAVING PLANT

At the regular meeting of the city ouncil Wednesday two ordinances verg passed, one providing a fund of \$25,000 for enlarging the city paving plant and the other making it pos sible for the city to bond property and put in paving with the city paving plant. Up to the present the city had no authority to follow this procedure except where bids wer asked for from contracting firms. In ases where the city has done the work, as in the case of Ninety-second street, the consent of the propertyowners had to be secured and the cost of the improvement collected before work could be commenced. It is estimated that the city will be able to eliminate from one-third to one-half the cost in paving.

The ordinance passed the council without a dissenting vote, the opposition to the city entering the paving business as voiced by Mayor Baker and Commissioner Pier not developing. This opposition, it was reported, had been eliminated at a council sesion behind locked doors Tuesday afternoon




