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REV. BRACKENBURY TO SPEAK ON CENTENARY CONVENTION

Sunday morning at the regular hour Rev. A. C. Brackenbury will speak at the Laurelwood M. E. church on the centenary pageant which was given at Columbus, Ohio, during the past few weeks. Mr. Brackenbury returned last Saturday morning from Columbus where he had attended the Methodist centenary celebration. This mammoth conference was held at the Ohio state fair grounds, upwards of 50,000 people daily attending the services. The celebration was in honor of the anniversary of Methodist missions, home and foreign, and was the climax of the world-wide drive for funds in the interest of Methodism. The pageant entitled "The Wayfarer," of which Mr. Brackenbury will speak next Sunday, is said not only to have rivaled but to have excelled the famous Passion Play of Oberammergau. It is staged according to the dramatization of Bible and modern church history by the Rev. Crowther of the First M. E. church of Seattle, and inasmuch as it was a presentation in connection with Methodist affairs, the concluding scenes relate particularly to the history of that church.

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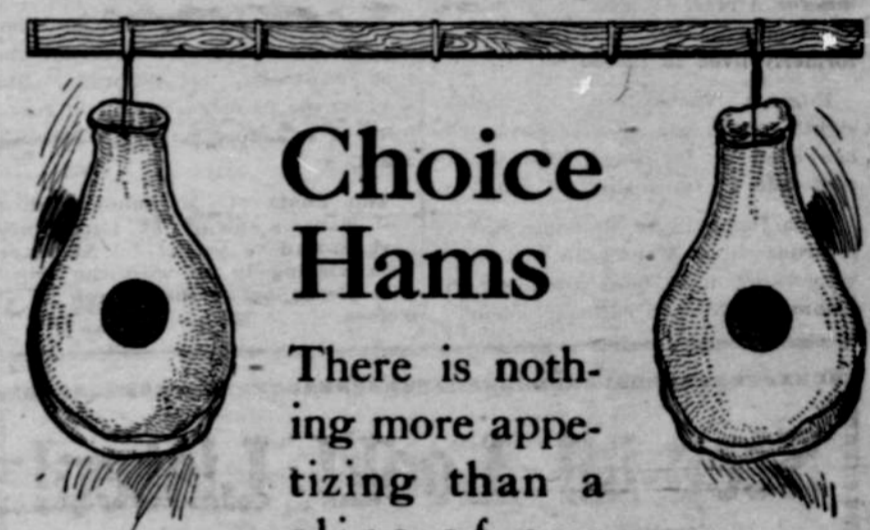
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
