Preaching services at Happy Hollow at 3 p. m.

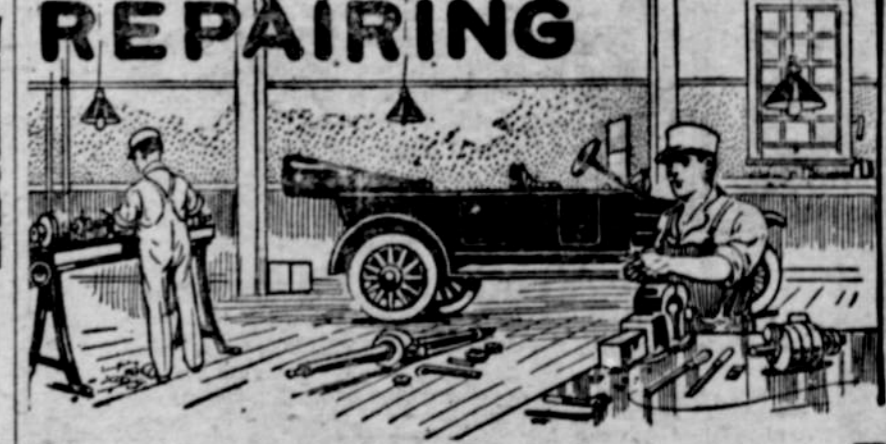
