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U. S. SOLDIERS SERVING IN CANADIAN ARMY ELIGIBLE TO RECEIVE GRATUITY

The Herald is in receipt of the following letter from the secretary of the British Columbia Returned Soldier Commission. The secretary is George F. Pyke, Parliament building, Victoria, B. C. Anyone coming within the provisions mentioned in his letter should write him for further information:

"A great many men who served in the Canadian army are now resident in the United States, particularly on the Pacific coast.

"Under the original order in council dealing with the payment of war service gratuities, men who did not see service in France and men who were discharged previous to the signing of the armistice on November 11, 1918, were not entitled to participate in same.

"Under a recent order in council this ruling has been changed and men who come under the above classification are now entitled to payment of gratuity.

The assistant district paymaster advises me that a great many men who are entitled to gratuity under this order have not yet filed applications

for same. I should appreciate it very much if you could see your way clear to make these facts public through the columns of your paper in the hope that they might be read by some of the men interested.

"If any man who comes under the above category will write me enclosing a copy of his discharge certificate I will be pleased to furnish him all particulars regarding this gratuity, also the necessary application forms.

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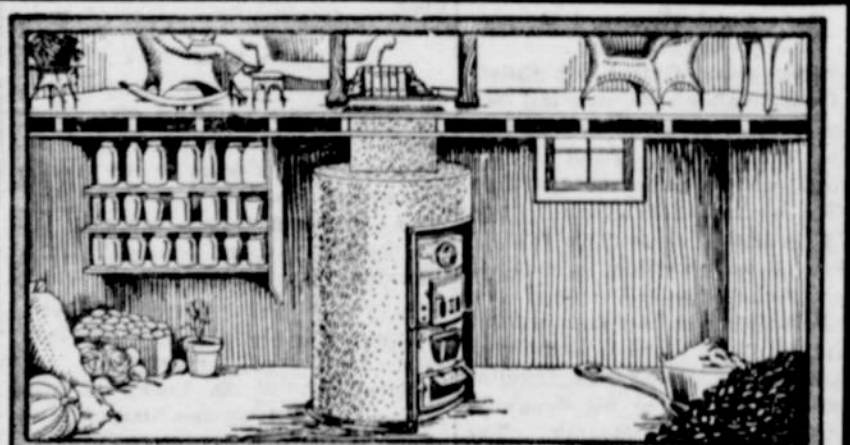
