## BANKS AS COMMUNITY SERVANTS

From bankers for local, state and general government, the banks became bankers for the people over the war period.

They helped float the liberty loans, helped the people buy them and now are helping them collect their interest from the government.

Many holders of liberty bonds are not collecting the interest when it falls due; perhaps it does not seem to the holder worth bothering about, and the banks attend to it for him, however small the amount.

Some bondholders fail to clip coupons with the idea that by letting the government keep the interest they were helping pay the war debt. But when interest falls due the treasurer must hold in readiness a sum sufficient to pay it all.

The banks attend to these matters cheerfully and without charge, merely as part of modern banking methods.

## SUGAR CONSUMPTION INCREASING

Increased sugar and candy consumption exceeds sugar production.

U. S. beet sugar production in the current year seems likely to be about 1,750,000,000 pounds, against 1,385,000,000 in the year before the war, and five million pounds in 1890.

The cane sugar crop, which is unusually low, seems likely to form less than one-fifth of the total output of the country on account of conditions in Central Europe.

## OUR OREGON WEEKLY INDUSTRIAL REVIEW

### Interesting News of Payrolls and Enterprises in all Sections of the State.

A \$75,000 hotel is to be built at Union.

A shingle mill is to be built at Lebanon.

A contract has been let for a \$19,925 school house at Wilbur.

Alfalfa crops at Hermiston are yielding farmers \$100 an acre.

The Buehner sawmill at North Bend is building a shingle mill plant.

Several new buildings are to be erected for the Indian school at Chemawa.

It is announced from Eugene that the valley mint crop will bring 16,000.

A short Horn beef cow sold at Medford for \$4100, the record price for the coast.

Pheasant Northwest Products company is to erect a \$165,000 cold storage plant at Salem.

A modern fireproof garage, 100x100 feet, two stories high, is to be erected at Cottage Grove.

Twenty-five thousand boxes of apples were sold by growers at Hermiston for from \$2.32 to \$2.95 a box.

John Alexander, of Roseburg, has ordered 15,000 loganberry plants for himself and Blakely brothers, who reside near Glide. Mr. Alexander expects to plant a number of acres of loganber-

ries on his farm at Glide the coming winter. Loganberries have brought excellent returns to the growers of that vicinity and the industry seems destined to grow rapidly.

State printing office employees at Salem made a fight to raise wages to \$6 and \$6.50 and for a seven hour and 20 minute day. After adoption by newspapers and job offices the state agreed to pay the same scale.

Gold and silver mines near Baker will soon open. The Eureka and Excelsior properties have been leased by the Oregon-Idaho Investment company of Baker.

The East Oregon Lumber company, of Enterprise, will rebuild their mill which was destroyed by fire.

Seventeen tons of beans were raised on three acres by a man at Cottage Grove. The crop brought \$1700.

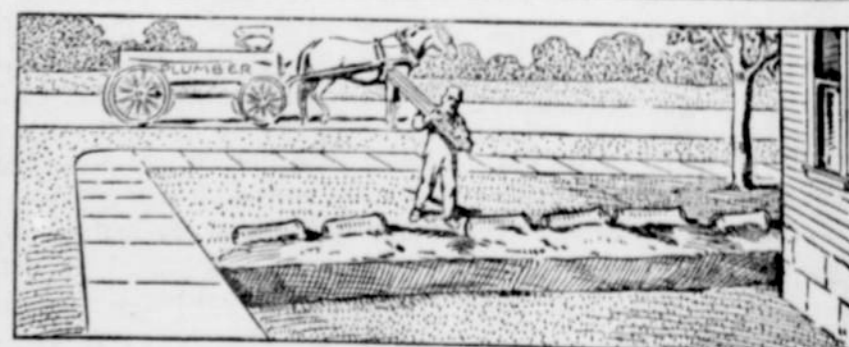
