### CAMPAIGN TO STAMP OUT JUVENILE CRIME

Concentrating every force upon a cleanup campaign designed to stamp out the root and branch of juvenile crime and the delinquency of youths and parents in Portland, Mayor Baker issued to the police department instructions to stamp out the evils.

On October 1 one of the first rules applied to enforce curfew is that regarding hours. Any youth found on the streets of the city after 8 p. m. will be called to account. Adults found upon the streets after midnight will be closely questioned.

In this connection Mayor Baker said:

"The application of these rules may seem somewhat severe, but the situation demands the most severe possible action and that is what we propose to apply. Law abiding and respectable persons will have no fault to find with the application of the laws of the city."

Paternal responsibility will not be overlooked, as the following statement by the mayor shows.

"Investigation has revealed the fact that a great part of the juvenile delinquency and juvenile crime is due to boys and girls being allowed to remain out at late hours of the night. To correct this condition, which in growing steadily more serious, parents of the city are urged to cooperate with the police bureau in the campaign to be made along this line by keeping their boys and girls at home at night.

"For the information of parents and children unwilling to cooperate in this movement

notice is hereby given that orders have been forwarded to the police board to begin on October 1 the strict enforcement of the curfew and "after hours" ordinance of the city.

"The curfew ordinance makes it unlawful for any child under the age of 18 years to be in or remain in or upon any street, alley or other public place at night after 8 o'clock p. m. from the first day of October of any year to the last day of February of the following year, unless such child is accompanied by a parent, guardian or other person having the care and custody of such child, or whose employment makes it necessary to be in or upon such street, alley or public place during the night time after such specified hours.

"The after hours ordinance makes it unlawful for any person to roam about the streets at night after 12 o'clock without having lawful business upon the streets at that time."

### Makes Trip to Southern Oregon

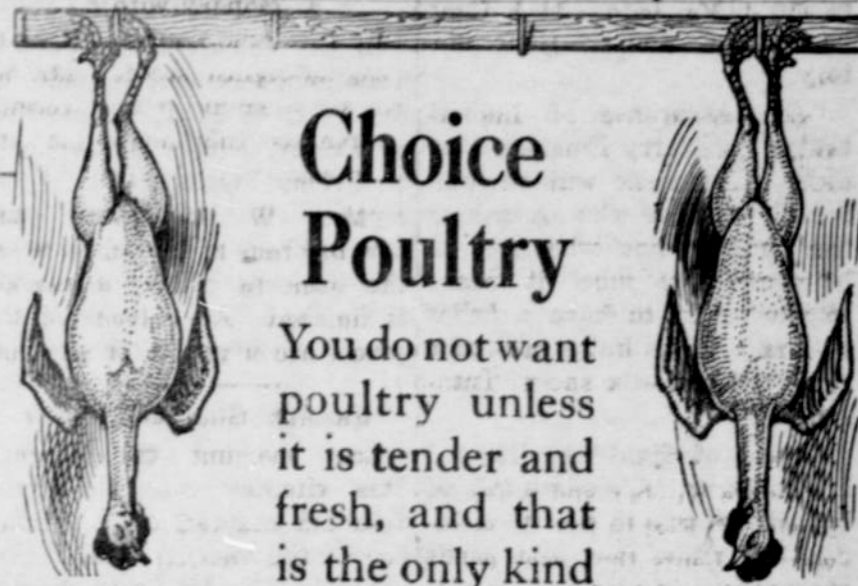

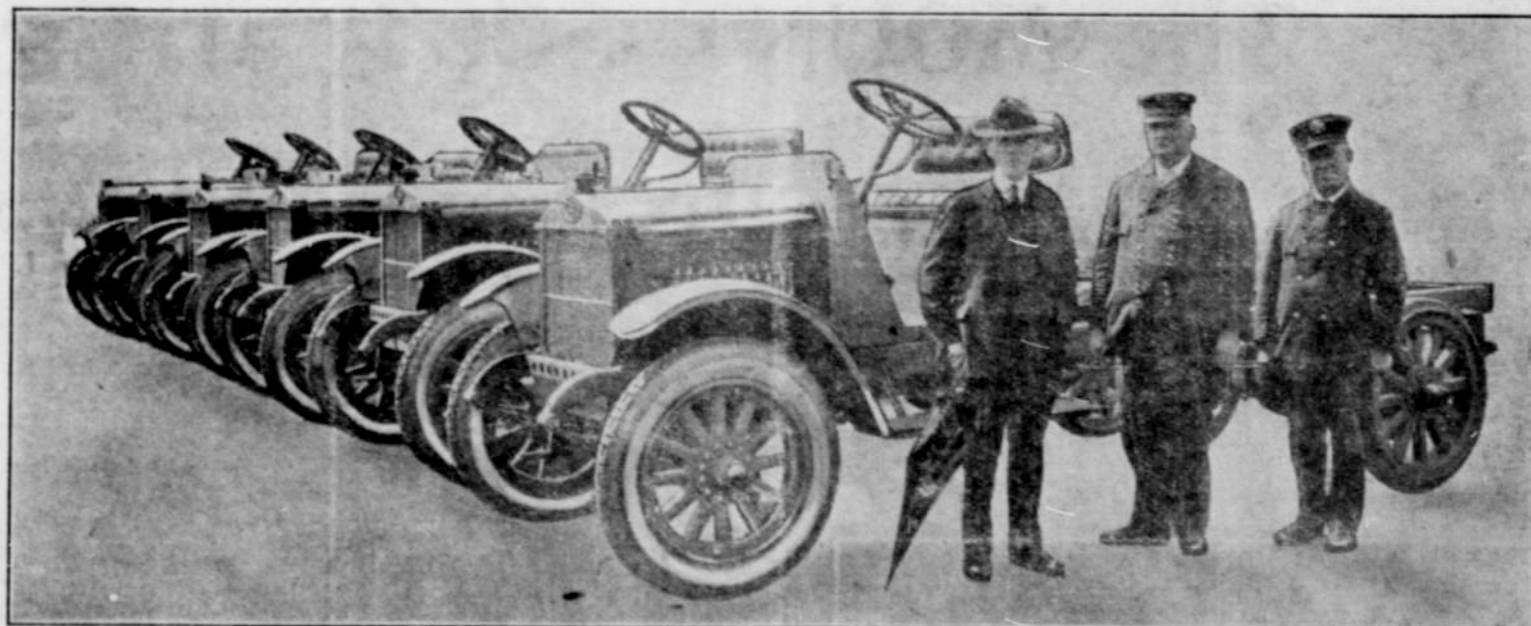
