Politics in the Grange.

Another example has been shown northwestern farmers of the disadvantage of letting politicians of a radical stripe get control of the grange. The same incident is also a warning of what may happen if these politicians remain in control during the elections of next year.

At certain granges in the western part of this state meetings have been addressed by advocate of the so-called triple alliance. This is a political amalgamation of farmers committed to the principle of the non-partisan league, a faction of the state federation of labor and some members of the railway unions. Its aim is to control the state elections next year and to play a part in local elections wherever it can.

Grange members objected to this manner of introducing political propaganda into their meetings but State Grange Master Bouck, well known for his radical propensities, overruled the objection, which was promptly carried up to the national headquarters. Now a ruling has been received from the national master declaring that a discussion of the triple alliance is improper matter for a grange meeting, as the alliance is obviously a political organization. The national laws of the grange forbid political discussions at meetings.

Of course, the farmers who started the discussions, and the state grange master, who upheld them, knew they were violating a rule of the order, but as their interests are with politics first and the grange second they would have kept their propaganda going regardless. Granges that do not care for the Bouck brand of politics will have to keep constantly alert.—Spokane Review.
