The work of the Girl Reserves, which was recently presented at Woodmere by Miss Marion Blackwell, is considered a very attractive movement for girls. In each school the girls are to form their own group and to carry it on under a supervisor. All sorts of interesting and recreational games, programs and entertainments are to be a part of the work. The unit of the organization is called a corps; two corps constitute a company, and all the corps in the city make a division. Girls of certain ages will belong to one corps and those older or younger than these will belong to others. A free swim is given to each corps once a week under a competent instructor. A system of honors similar to that used by the campfire girls has been inaugurated, and as honors are won chevrons are added to the armband.
