### STATE INDUSTRIAL NEWS BOILED DOWN

A syndicate has been formed at Roseburg to build a new tourist hotel.

Heppner has voted bonds for \$100,000 for a gravity water system.

McMinnville business men are backing a fruit and vegetable cannery.

Stayton, which has a large excelsior industry, wants a mattress factory.

The sawmills at Reedsport have payrolls of approximately \$1100 per day.

Citizens are agitating for a better highway between Harrisburg and Eugene.

The apple pack at Hood River this year is estimated to be worth \$5,000,000.

Sportsmen at The Dalles are raising a fund to install a fish ladder over Columbia falls.

The fishing industry on the Umpqua river will pay \$600,000 to its employes this year.

The Umpqua Timber company has been organized at Gardiner with capital stock of \$250,000.

It is expected the highway between Portland and Hillsboro will be completed by the 20th of this month.

The starch factory at Beaverton is enlarging the plant and accumulating potatoes for oper-

ation. The industry failed last year from lack of labor to harvest the potato crop.

The salmon pack on the coast from Grays Harbor to Rogue river is 50 per cent short this season.

Water for irrigation purposes is to be put on 30,000 acres in southern Wasco county. The

water will be secured from Clear lake.

The Dalles has decided to install cluster lights on the main business streets and change the county poor farm into a county fair grounds.

The Eugene Fruit Growers association is selling apple pulp, formerly considered of no value, to a Missouri concern for \$60 per ton.

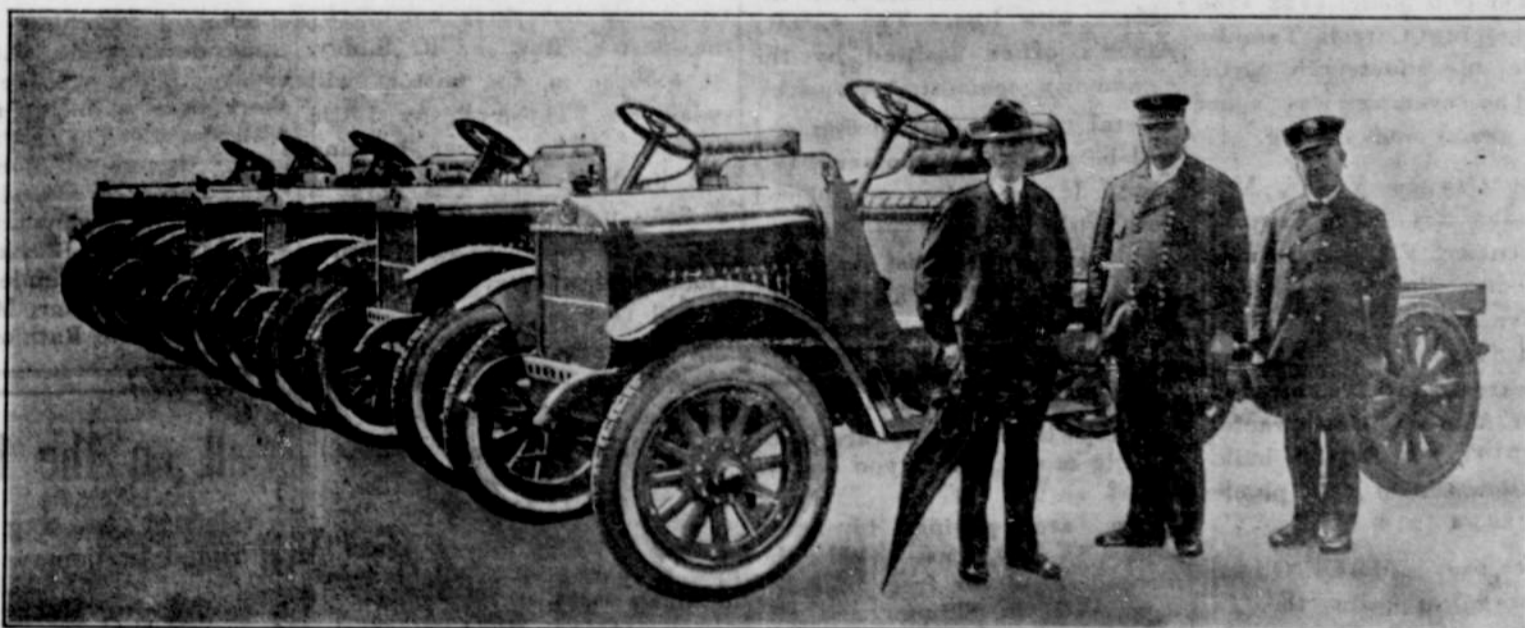
